Course Description

Law enforcement officers are usually the first responders to crisis events. This in-depth, 40-hour course is geared to the uniformed patrol law enforcement officer who will be required to respond to crisis calls involving people with behavioral disabilities. It will provide police officers with education about mental illness and other behavioral disabilities and skills and tools for effective and safe interaction.

Officers must have completed two years of service on the street in a non-probationary status to attend.

Mark A. Benson is a state-wide CIT Coordinator who will facilitate a panel composed of qualified/experienced specialists in their field from throughout state. Mark's experience includes 19 years at Human Services in McLean County, 10 years in the student counseling program at Illinois Wesleyan University, 18 years as a jail counselor, 8 years in private practice, and 5 years working with the drug and mental health courts—serving in several of these positions simultaneously.
