| <p>The Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) of 2003 is a Federal law established to address the elimination and prevention of sexual assault and rape in correctional systems. PREA applies to all federal, state and local prisons, jails, lockups, private facilities, and community settings such as residential facilities, and it mandates specific training based on different categories of personnel.
