Course Description

In the wake of several recent high-profile use of force incidents, officer de-escalation skills have come to the forefront of the national narrative regarding police and citizen contacts. But what is de-escalation and how does it occur? Front-line De-escalation approaches this important topic from the perspective of a front-line officer. Presented using a practical approach, this course will provide the law enforcement professional with basic knowledge and skills necessary to understand the concept of de-escalation and to begin effectively implementing this tactic in the field.

Course Objectives

Define de-escalation in a law enforcement context

- ✓ Understand why de-escalation is critical and effective
- ✓ Recognize that verbal control is an important element in the context of use of force
- ✓ Recognize and propose methods to achieve police goal without use of force
- ✓ Recognize the role ego plays in suspect control
- ✓ Recognize appropriate follow-up action in situations where verbal control maybe ineffective or has failed
- ✓ Identify methods for effective decision-making in critical incidents that can lead to successful de-escalation
- ✓ Identify factors that can impede successful de-escalation of critical incidents
- ✓ Identify the areas of the brain responsible for stress and performance and their effects
- ✓ Identify factors that activate the sympathetic nervous system/fight-or-flight response
- ✓ Identify the impact that fight-or-flight activation has on decision making and performance
- ✓ Identify strategies and considerations for the successful de-escalation of critical incidents
- ✓ Engage in discussion of case studies involving Federal court decisions in de-escalation incidents
- ✓ Identify non-verbal communication/threat cues that can assist an officer in the decision-making process
