Course Description

Report writing is often considered an afterthought or a necessary evil of a job that many find mundane and unimportant. Still others, while recognizing the need for written reports, fail to perceive and understand the importance and benefits of a well-written report documenting the facts and details of a case.

Poorly written reports are problems lying in wait, setting officers and agencies up for failure through damaged credibility, unsuccessful prosecutions, and lawsuits. The goal of this course is to identify the need for and characteristics of well-written reports, as well as raise officer awareness of the benefits of thorough documentation. This course also discusses strategies for preparing effective, written documentation of law enforcement field activities.
